REPORTER

Mario! Is it true that you sold thousands of armed Yoshis to Saddam?

MARIO

What I do with my highly dangerous dinosaurs is my business, and if Bush has a problem with it he can kiss my ass. So, are you making one of those new home videos?

REPORTER

I'm a reporter for CNN sir. We're live.

MARIO

(surprised)  
.....Oh.

NARRATOR (V.O.)

As sales rose, so did Mario's mishaps and mushroom-filled escapades.

INT. STUDIO - DAY

Yoshi sits down on chair talking to interviewer. Subtitles appear at bottom of screen while Yoshi talks.

YOSHI (SUBTITLE)

By the early 90s, Mario was always high, and the few times he wasn't he got depressed. Violently depressed.

LUIGI

He was never home. It was always

3 in the morning to go kill

INT. STUDIO - DAY

YOSHI (SUBTITLE)

Koopas began to trigger Mario, and he should've gotten help. Hell, I should've told him to go get help. Saying it was a massacre would be an understatement.

NARRATOR (V.O.)

For Mario, the burden of being a star took it's toll, and the star's shine began to dim with the weight of the video game industry on his shoulders.

TOAD

Mario became a real asshole in the 90s. You know I wasn't supposed to wear a diaper right? His decision. I'm an adult man... wearing a diaper... It's fucking demoralizing.

NARRATOR (V.O.)
